This overview summarizes the major initiatives and highlights proposed and executed throughout the program year. The CAPER covers the period from September 1, 2023, to August 31, 2024. The City of El Paso is committed to enhancing the quality of life for its residents through four key programs: the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, the HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program, and the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) Program. Additionally, the City implemented a program using CDBG-CV funds to address the ongoing COVID-19 health crisis.

CDBG funding supported public service projects and public facilities citywide, benefiting low- to moderate-income families in underserved areas. Highlights of CDBG initiatives include:

- One public facilities project completed that assisted 13,558 individuals
- Funding for six public service programs that collectively assisted 4,821 individuals
- Basic repairs for 50 households through the volunteer housing rehabilitation program
- CDBG-Revolving Loan Funds (RLF) allocated to assist 11 minor home repairs for low-income homeowners
- One CDBG-CV program was successfully completed, providing case management services to unhoused individuals.

The ESG program funded four goals outlined in the City's Annual Action Plan, each addressing a distinct component of ESG. Four agencies received funding for their programs, all of which exceeded their performance targets, assiting 867 households with 1284 individuals.

No HOME funds were utilized during this performance period. In the upcoming year, all HOME activities will be funded with program income until prior year HOME PI is exhausted at which point HOME entitlement will be utilized.

Finally, the HOPWA grant provided Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) and supportive services to 90 unduplicated clients, including individuals living with HIV/AIDS and their 29 family members.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

During the fourth reporting period of the 5-year Consolidated Plan, the City used its CDBG entitlement funds to support public services projects Citywide, and fund public facilities projects citywide. Completed projects addressed the HUD national objective of providing services and improvements that benefit low to moderate income persons or households, all while taking into consideration the results of the Community

needs assessment which were reflected on the AAP.

Completed project(s) under Public Facilities utilized previous years' funding. Under Public Facilities one healthcare improvement project - Centro San Vicente Healthcare Center Renovation Project included renovating 5,948 of square feet at Centro San Vicente's main health center located at 8061 Alameda Ave. The areas of renovation included the laboratory, patient registration and three wait areas: registration, pharmacy and laboratory. This includes construction of a new entry way which will help to maximize existing clinical space and future expansion efforts. More specifically, renovations comprised of demolition and build up of walls, framing, replacement the old stained tiles, installation of new baseboards, drywall and painting of walls, installation of glass doors, composites, (rough carpentry and millwork), air ducting and ventilation, data/telephone installation, security cameras, fire alarm and smoke detectors. The proposed scope of work maximized space efficiencies and working space, improved patient flow, provided productivity, increased the number of patients served, and created a more sterile clinical environment.

Under Public Services, the programs aimed to enhance mental health and empower residents through various initiatives. It provided court advocacy for children removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect, focusing on stable placements. The project also served children in crisis by offering emergency shelter and essential supplies. For homeless youth, it provided emergency housing, case management, and vital services. Additionally, it assisted elderly individuals and adults with disabilities in managing their finances. Finally, the project addressed the needs of adult men and women experiencing homelessness by providing shelter and necessary support. Overall, these efforts tackled issues related to housing, mental health, food security, and resident empowerment.

Under HOME and CDBG RLF, 11 households were assisted under Single-Family Owner-Occupied Program. 11 households were assisted under Single Family Owner Occupied Minor Repair Assistance (CDBG-RLF).

The City utilized ESG funds to tackle various aspects of housing and homelessness. Programs focused on Rapid Rehousing and Homelessness Prevention included rental assistance and case management, with a strong emphasis on increasing participants' income and creating opportunities through various supportive services. The Street Outreach component, implemented by a local mental health agency, offered clients navigation services and personalized recovery plans. The City's focus on these ESG components demonstrates its commitment to addressing the growing homeless population, exacerbated by rising rents and a booming housing market. The Homelessness Prevention program notably exceeded its target for households served, and all components surpassed their goals for individuals and households assisted.

Additionally, the HOPWA program supported individuals through one agency.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

During this reporting period, the City expended:

- -\$3,083,173.86 from CDBG entitlement funds for administration, facilities, and services.
- -\$91,037.26 from CDBG-CV funds for services.
- -\$200,038.38 from CDBG Revolving Loan Funds (RLF) for rehabilitation and administration.

These CDBG funds supported direct assistance initiatives and leveraged an additional \$2,869,390 for services and \$51,198.00 for facilities. Leveraged funding included contributions from other federal funds, state grants, and private funds. For a comprehensive financial summary, please refer to the "PR 26 CDBG Financial Summary Report" in Section CR-00 under the CDBG Attachment.

HOME Investment Partnerships Grant (HOME)

In this reporting period, \$486,001 in HOME funds were allocated to various projects. Details on the status of HOME Grants can be found in the "PR 27 Status of HOME Grants" in Section CR-00, under the HOME Attachment.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)

The City expended a total of \$559,053.11 in ESG grant funds, covering administrative costs and other activities. ESG funds also leveraged an additional \$569,712.75 in matching contributions from various sources, including other federal and state funds, local government, and private contributions through sub-recipients.

Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA)

The City expended \$1,074,526 in HOPWA grant funds, which supported tenant-based rental assistance, supportive services, and administrative expenses. No additional funding sources were leveraged with HOPWA funds. For more details, refer to the "HOPWA CAPER" report in Section CD-00.

Narrative

Rebuilding Together is a volunteer-driven program dedicated to enhancing the safety, accessibility, and overall livability of homes for eligible residents in El Paso, specifically focusing on elderly individuals and residents with disabilities. Through this program, volunteers work to create safer and more suitable living environments, which significantly improve the quality of life for those who may face mobility challenges or live on fixed incomes.

Each project is capped at \$4,999 per address, ensuring a wide reach within the community. Renovations under the program include critical improvements, such as roof repairs and replacements to prevent leaks and structural damage, as well as bathroom upgrades, such as tub-to-shower conversions, which make bathing safer and easier for residents with limited mobility. Additionally, accessibility modifications, such as the installation of grab bars and ramps, are added to support the independence and safety of residents in their homes.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - DCHD expended \$985,359 in CDBG funding to public service programs that provided services to the following categories: Children and Youth; Medical and Mental Health; Seniors and Persons with Disabilities; Homeless, Emergency Shelter and Housing Services. These agencies leveraged \$3,963,117.00 in other funds to support these projects.

DCHD also awarded Rebuilding Together El Paso, Inc. which resulted in \$115,000 in leverage.

HOME Investment Partnerships Grant (HOME) - The HOME program does not require matching funds.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) - In compliance with federal regulations (24 CFR 576.201 and 2 CFR 200.306), the City implemented a one-to-one matching requirement for its Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs, mandating that for every dollar of ESG funds spent, an equivalent amount must be matched from other sources. To help meet this requirement, the City leveraged its administrative portion of the ESG program using general funds. Matching funds for ESG programs came from diverse sources, including other federal funds, the state-funded Homeless Housing and Services Program (HHSP), cash contributions, and substantial in-kind resources like real property, equipment, volunteer hours, and donations. While these contributions have expanded the program's reach and impact, they have also created additional strain on partner agencies responsible for securing and managing these resources.

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) - No other funds were contributed to support this program as leverage is not required. Please refer to the HOPWA CAPER provided in Section CD-00 for more information.

The City's overhaul of the Single Family Owner Occipied Program process, combined with a local shortage of qualified contractors, resulted in 11 projects completed.

The El Paso housing market, characterized by high demand and low supply, led to increased purchase prices. Despite HUD's allowance of a higher purchase price for single-family homes, moderate-income households, especially first-time homebuyers, were largely excluded due to rising sales prices. Limited

available stock within the income guidelines exacerbated this issue. Homes for sale often required repairs, and with multiple offers on a limited supply, sellers preferred as-is offers, making it challenging to support first-time homebuyers, resulting in 0 first-time homebuyers closing on a home.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

Anticipated outcomes in future annual action plans will be adjusted to align with modifications to the City's anticipated in the First Time Home Buyer Program and Single Family Owner Occupied programs. The demand for affordable rental units among low-income residents in El Paso exceeds the current supply, and this gap is expected to widen significantly by 2025. The city consistently reevaluates its approach to maximize the impact of Home funds.

To address the critical need identified in the El Paso Regional Housing Plan, the city commenced the development and rehabilitation of multi-family affordable rental housing in November 2023. This initiative, kickstarted through a Notice of Funding Availability, garnered substantial interest from the local community of affordable housing developers. The Department of Community and Human Development (DCHD) plans to allocate HUD funding totaling \$19,229,163.32, leveraging an additional \$29,490,461.00 from project developers. This collaborative effort will lead to the construction and renovation of 258 affordable rental housing units, marking an unprecedented local investment in affordable housing. It also serves as a model for the strategic deployment of HUD funds to address ongoing affordable housing needs in El Paso.

Narrative Information

Eleven Single Family Owner Occupied projects were successfully completed by the City, providing assistance to nineteen individuals with extremely low or low incomes. The limited availability of qualified contractors and challenges in procurement played a role in the lower-than-anticipated numbers.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

In January 2024, the El Paso Coalition for the Homeless conducted its annual Point-in-Time (PIT) count, a crucial survey that assesses the needs of individuals experiencing homelessness across various populations, including veterans, youth, and families. Trained case workers assist participants in completing the survey, ensuring comprehensive data collection to better understand the community's needs.

To address these needs, clients in emergency shelters and transitional programs are regularly interviewed, allowing for ongoing needs assessments. These insights help develop tailored programs aimed at promoting independence and self-sufficiency.

The City of El Paso has significantly enhanced its outreach efforts through the "El Paso Helps" initiative, which operates a 24/7 street outreach service and a Welcome Center, all funded by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). This program connects individuals in crisis with vital services via an online portal, providing access to live agents who assist with housing placement, emergency shelter, food assistance, and mental health servicesâ¿¿

El Paso Helps builds on the success of the Delta Welcome Center, which provided temporary shelter to over 5,000 individuals during the COVID-19 pandemic. This initiative underscores the city's commitment to addressing homelessness and ensuring that all residents have access to the support they needâ¿¿. Thye have been able to reach over 11,000 people in the last year.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of El Paso has made considerable progress in addressing homelessness by combining various funding sources beyond standard HUD resources, especially with support from American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. A key initiative includes establishing a no-barrier Welcome Center to provide immediate, accessible shelter for individuals in urgent need. Additionally, the city has used CDBG funds to bolster service projects that receive limited support through ESG. However, the 15% cap on CDBG services and limited ESG funding have created a significant challenge, requiring the city to make strategic yet difficult decisions to maximize the impact of limited resources.

El Paso's comprehensive approach focuses on key objectives: reducing the length of stay in shelters, facilitating rapid exits to permanent housing, and providing robust case management services. These initiatives are designed to help clients maintain stability after leaving shelters, connecting them to

employment opportunities and mainstream resources tailored to their specific needs.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of El Paso is proactively working to prevent homelessness among low-income individuals and families, particularly those who are extremely low-income or likely to become homeless after discharge from publicly funded institutions. This commitment is supported by various funding sources, including HUD and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). These resources are directed toward rapid rehousing, homelessness prevention efforts, and the establishment of a new youth shelter specifically for young women aging out of foster care.

The County of El Paso also operates a Re-entry Program for individuals exiting jail, ensuring they receive essential case management and support to facilitate their transition back into the community. To effectively support those at risk also utilizes, El Paso utilizes a Coordinated Entry (CE) system, which assesses and prioritizes individuals based on their housing needs. This system connects clients to

appropriate services, including prevention programs and permanent housing solutions.

The city places significant emphasis on thorough discharge planning, ensuring that no individual leaves a public facility without a housing plan. This proactive case management approach helps clients secure stable housing and addresses the risk of homelessness.

El Paso Helps is a vital collaborative initiative that provides immediate support to residents in crisis. It connects individuals with essential services, such as shelter, food assistance, and mental health support, through a 24/7 online portal. This program works in partnership with local organizations, reinforcing the city's commitment to supporting vulnerable populations and preventing homelessness.

Through these comprehensive strategies, the City of El Paso aims to help low-income individuals and families avoid homelessness, especially those transitioning out of systems of care or receiving assistance from public and private agencies.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of El Paso and the El Paso Helps Collaborative are at the forefront of initiatives aimed at ending

homelessness, particularly for vulnerable populations such as veterans, families with children, and chronically homeless individuals. Through a coordinated approach leveraging various funding sources, including HUD and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), the city has significantly enhanced its capacity to provide rapid rehousing, homelessness prevention, and critical support services, including shelter options like the Welcome Center and the new youth shelter for young women aging out of foster care. El Paso Helps serves as a central hub in this effort, bringing together a coalition of providers to deliver essential housing interventions and support services tailored to the needs of those experiencing homelessness. This initiative connects individuals to vital resources, including shelter, food assistance, and mental health support, thereby facilitating smoother transitions to permanent housing. To further streamline assistance, the city employs a Coordinated Entry (CE) system, which assesses and prioritizes individuals at risk of homelessness, ensuring they are matched with the most appropriate services. Additionally, the County of El Paso runs a Re-entry Program for individuals exiting the jail system, ensuring they receive essential case management and support during their transition. Through its commitment and the collaborative framework of El Paso Helps, the city is making significant strides in helping homeless persons transition to permanent housing and independent living, reducing the duration of homelessness, and preventing recidivism among those who have recently been housed. This comprehensive strategy reflects El Paso's dedication to fostering long-term stability for its most vulnerable residents.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

For this reporting period, the City of El Paso continued to address the needs of public housing residents by funding housing counseling and homeownership preparation training for Housing Choice Voucher-Homeownership Program Clients, and providing assistance to qualifying Housing Opportunities Management Enterprises (HOME) tenants through the sell of scaettered site homes. Additionally, the City continues to provide Consolidated Plan certifications of consistency for HOME projects and proposals and for its Annual/Five-Year Plan submission. HOME has continued the extensive rehabilitation of its properties, as well as the construction of new properties through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) Program. Through the RAD Program, HOME is addressing the extensive physical and capital needs of its communities while ensuring the stability of the agency so that it may continue to provide affordable housing opportunities to those in need. As HOME has completed its RAD projects. It is now rehabbing properties that were previously public housing to PBV and maximizing its Faircloth units.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City encourages qualifying graduates of the HOME Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Assistance Program to participate in homeownership. HOME promotes resident involvement through the following activities and programs:

- Health fairs
- Flu shots at properties where the majority of residents are elderly
- Homeownership preparation
- Budgeting guidance over the phone
- Family self-sufficiency activities
- Scholarship assistance
- Monthly food distribution for the elderly

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The City only has one PHA, Housing Opportunities Management Enterprises (HOME) and it is a high performer.

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

DCHD has developed strong partnerships with investors, non-profits, Community Housing Development Organizations, and the Housing Authority to increase, improve and preserve the affordable housing stock in El Paso. The City has developed, in coordination with professional affordable housing consultant firm, HR&A, a Regional Housing Plan that identifies the current and projected gap in affordable housing in the region, and identifies strategies for minimizing the potential future increase in that gap. The City has completed the development of four major transportation corridors to expand and improve transportation throughout the City. The City's Low Income Housing Tax Credit policy for providing support to potential projects (which in turn provides points for projects during State evaluation) incentivizes developers to locate their projects within a quarter mile of transit stops along those four routes. The Tax Credit policy also incentivizes development in two Priority Housing Areas where significant investment is ongoing, in an attempt to avoid gentrification of those areas. DCHD funded Rebuilding Together for a Volunteer Housing Rehabilitation program for the elderly and/or disabled under which up to \$4,999 may be allocated per home, used in combination with matching funding, donations and volunteers to provide housing rehabilitation. This has increased the City's capacity to provide housing rehabilitation and assist low and moderate income homeowners to remain in their homes.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The El Paso CoC continues to prioritize a Housing First approach and offers low- to no-barrier assistance, allowing people experiencing homelessness quick access to stable, permanent housing. A key part of this strategy includes streamlining the Coordinated Entry (CE) system to identify and prioritize households with the greatest needs. For those in Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) who have stabilized and no longer need intensive services, the CoC offers alternative Permanent Housing (PH) options. This shift frees up PSH units for individuals moving directly from street conditions or shelters.

Over the past four years, the CoC has closely monitored and analyzed data to better identify underserved populations in collaboration with HUD advisors. This includes comparing HMIS data with upcoming Point-in-Time (PIT) Count results and County Census data to refine racial equity in service access and outcomes.

As a separate strategy, El Paso Helps supports this effort by providing targeted outreach and resource navigation, helping to address obstacles to serving underserved populations. Together, these efforts work to expand and adjust housing services, ensuring that resources reach those most in need in the community.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Incorporated as standard practice in all City of El Paso DCHD contracts for the construction or rehabilitation of residential structures, all contractors and subcontractors are required to comply with provisions for the elimination of lead-based paint (LBP) hazards set forth in 24 CFR Part 35. All LBP testing, risk assessments, project designs and clearance testing are done by qualified contractors licensed by the State of Texas. The contractors conduct lead-based inspections using XRF (x-ray fluorescent) spectrum analysis. Their inspection reports include a list of occupants, Lead Inspection Report, Risk Assessment, XRF Lead Results, Laboratory results, Lead Project Design, Instrument calibration results, Lead Sampling Drawing, Certifications for the Lead Firm, the Lead Inspector, the Risk Assessor, Lead Abatement Project Designer, Laboratory, and the Spectrum Analyzer's radiation safety record. Lead Clearance testing is performed after completion of all abatement and/or Interim Control activities.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of El Paso is dedicated to reducing the number of families living in poverty by focusing on housing stability and offering comprehensive support services. The city works actively to keep families in their homes while quickly rehousing those who have lost their housing. Significant resources from both HUD and non-HUD funding are allocated for rental and utility assistance, homeless prevention, emergency shelter, child care, and other essential services aimed at households most at risk of economic hardship.

Additionally, the El Paso Coalition for the Homeless is enhancing the income of its participants through various employment and training programs. These initiatives include job placement services, skills training, and access to workforce development resources, which help individuals secure stable employment and improve their financial situations.

The city also deployed in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding this year to address resource gaps for rapid rehousing, homeless prevention, street outreach, and resource navigation to further reduce the number of families living in poverty

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of El Paso prioritizes the creation of an effective and efficient program delivery system using federal funds, particularly through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs. During the CAPER period, the City continued to provide dedicated funding to shelters and service providers to enhance the overall system and improve program performance.

To address identified service gaps, the City has actively engaged in resource development to extend support to the El Paso Continuum of Care (CoC). This collaboration has been essential in advancing the Coordinated Entry system, which facilitates seamless service delivery for individuals experiencing homelessness.

The system utilizes the Vulnerability Index-Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT) for individuals, families, and youth, enabling accurate assessment of needs. This assessment process scores various responses to prioritize those with the greatest needs and effectively refer them to appropriate programs, significantly improving the chances of successful outcomes, including access to permanent housing.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is the key tool for enhancing coordination among public and private housing and social service agencies in El Paso. It identifies the community's specific needs, fostering collaboration and ensuring effective resource allocation.

By involving multiple agencies, the CNA provides a comprehensive understanding of local housing and social service needs, allowing for targeted strategies to fill service gaps and improve responses to homelessness. It also encourages ongoing communication and partnerships among agencies, leading to integrated services for vulnerable populations.

Additionally, the El Paso Helps Collaborative enhances the CNA's efforts by uniting organizations to share resources and information, strengthening the city's overall response to housing challenges

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The 2020 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice revealed important findings that inform our ongoing efforts in fair housing. The data suggests that discrimination against protected classes is minimal; however, affordability continues to be the main barrier for both homebuyers and renters. While there have been few recent complaints related to LGBTQ discrimination, there is a noted lack of local policies to protect these rights. Additionally, many residents may not recognize housing discrimination, which contributes to the low number of complaints filed.

To address these findings, our 2021 goal focuses on enhancing the process for tracking and reporting fair housing complaints. In 2020, we updated the Fair Housing website to improve accessibility, making it easier for residents to file complaints and access resources.

By implementing these actions, we remain committed to fostering a fair housing environment for all El Paso residents.

2021 AI Goal – Enhance the City's process for tracking and reporting fair housing complaints. 2020 AI Actions Implemented: The City has updated its Fair Housing website to be more user-friendly and better

assist residents in filing fair housing compliants. https://www.elpasotexas.gov/community-and-human-development/fair-housing/about-fair-housing/

2021 AI Goal – Ensure that all El Pasoans are protected against housing discrimination.

2020 AI Actions Implemented: The EI Paso City Council adopted new language in the Fair Housing Ordinance to provide protections against discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

2021 AI Goal – Increase affordable housing choice for all El Pasoans. 2020 AI Actions Implemented: The City of Paso has adopted Priority Housing Areas under the El Paso Regional Housing Plan. Incentives are now in place for developers seeking Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) to locate their projects in in the Medical Center of the Americas and Uptown Priority Housing Areas in order to insert new affordable housing into these areas with increased chance of gentrification due to significant private investment.

The Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) guides the involvement of citizens and organizations in planning, implementing, and assessing the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG), Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA), and HOME Investment Partnerships Programs. It provides citizens with avenues to engage in decision-making, contribute to program development, and give feedback on program performance.

The CPP emphasizes equity by actively engaging historically underserved and marginalized communities. This is achieved through the Community Needs Assessment (CNA), led by the DCHD Civic Empowerment team, which aims to align programming with community priorities. The CNA process seeks to gather community input on housing, development needs, and potential activities to address vulnerabilities, empowering residents and strengthening local government ties.

Newspaper Advertisements: Announcements in both English and Spanish reach a broad audience, notifying the public of funding availability, public hearings, and reports such as the Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plan, and CAPER, as well as any amendments. The 2023-2024 CAPER draft is available on the DCHD website, with instructions for Spanish versions.

Comment Period: After each public announcement, citizens are given a comment period to provide feedback on the content. This period for major reports, including the Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plan, CAPER, and amendments, lasts 15-30 days, ensuring ample opportunity for public engagement.

The 2023-2024 CAPER was available for public review and comment from Nov 1, 2024 to to November 15, 2024. Citizen comments were submitted to the DCHD office.

The City has strategically utilized additional federal funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) to supplement existing programs. This influx of resources has enabled the City to implement targeted strategies aimed at stabilizing housing situations, offering rental assistance, and enhancing social services for those in need.

Moving forward, the City of El Paso is dedicated to refining its programs to be more responsive to the community's evolving needs. This includes developing comprehensive housing strategies, fostering collaboration with local partners to expand services, and employing data-driven decision-making to prioritize resources effectively. These adjustments reflect the City's commitment to creating sustainable solutions that ensure long-term housing stability for all El Pasoans.

The inspections are conducted by Housing Programs staff in DCHD. All deficiencies are noted on a punch list which is then provided to the property owner. Deficiencies are required to be completed within 30 days of receipt of the punch list. The Property owner may request an extension of time in order to complete the repairs if circumstances beyond their control are identified. Project Completion Inspections - Upon completion of the project, the City of El Paso (COEP) will conduct an inspection to confirm that contracted work is completed and the property meets the property standards adopted by the COEP. Ongoing Property Inspections - On an ongoing basis throughout the period of affordability, the COEP will conduct inspections following an established schedule. To address this issue, the City identified these two areas, The Medical Center of the Americas and Uptown, as top priority areas for investment in affordable housing. To incentivize development of affordable housing in these areas, the City provides significantly more support for proposed LIHTC developments in those areas.

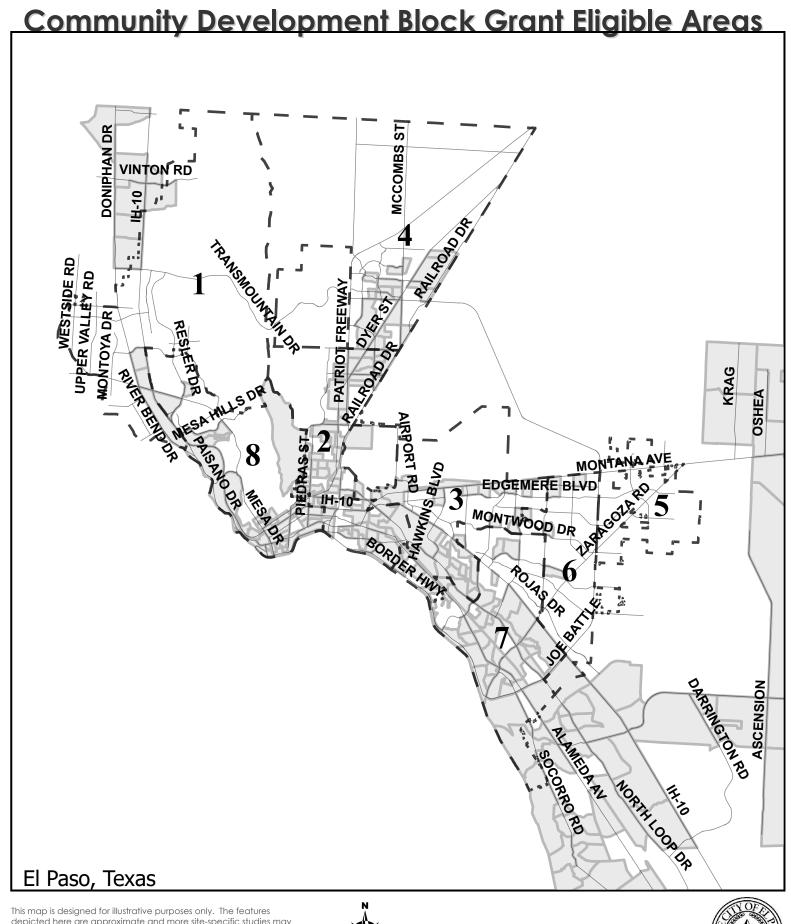

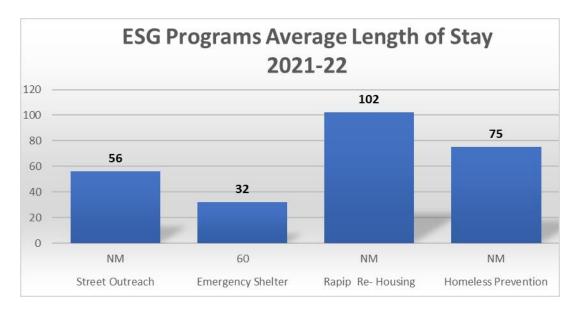

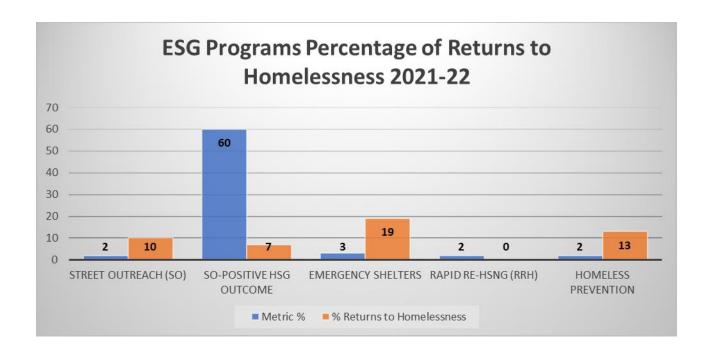
CR70 Graphs

The CR70 graphs are the combined ESG sub-recipient by-component graphs from HMIS data comparing actual performance to the Community Performance Plan (CPP) benchmarks. These comprehensive bycomponent graphs include Street Outreach (SO), Emergency Shelter (ES), Rapid Re-housing (RRH) and Homeless Prevention (HP) for ESG sub-recipients. The benchmarks for each program type were established by the CoC Performance and Benchmarks Committee, approved by the CoC Board in August 2021.

The report comes from an HMIS Administrative Annual Performance Report (APR) and the CAPER which is entered by each ESG sub-recipient into HMIS and then de-duplicated by HMIS. The data report spans a monitoring year of Sept 1, 2021 to August 31, 2022 in the combined by-component format.



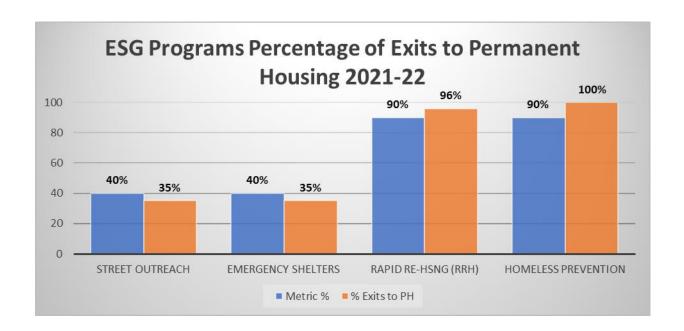
The Length of Stay benchmark measures the average number of days that a distinct household or person received services from an ESG program, calculated from the point of entry to the exit date. Average Length of Stay benchmark for Street Outreach (SO), Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) and Homeless Prevention (HP) will be noted and monitored (NM) but not evaluated as part of the Community Performance Plan (CPP) reviews. Additionally, these metrics have been approved for the 2021-22 monitoring year.



The Returns to Homelessness or Exit Destinations benchmark measures the percentage of the number of leavers who exited to Temporary Destinations from the total number of leavers. Temporary Destinations are considered Returns to Homelessness if they meet HUD definition;

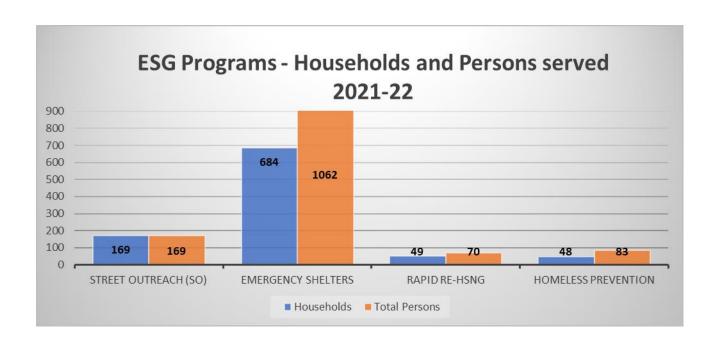
- Emergency shelters, including hotel or motel paid for without a emergency shelter voucher,
- Transitional housing for homeless persons (including homeless youth) or
- Place not meant for habitation (e.g., a vehicle, an abandoned building.

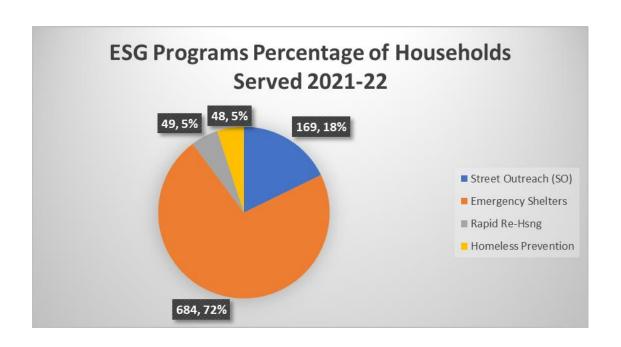
Regarding Street Outreach programs and the outcomes for Returns to Homelessness, HUD recognizes that street outreach teams move homeless individuals from the streets into an emergency (ES) or transitional shelter (TH) first, not primarily into permanent housing. According to the HUD definition, this move to ES and TH is still considered homelessness. HUD also recognizes these outreach efforts are a positive outcome. Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing provide the individual with a safe environment which has access to a case manager that will provide information on permanent housing solutions and other needed services. The Performance Committee and CoC Board in guidance with HUD recommendations see these placements from the street to a shelter as a positive housing outcome and approved the Positive Housing Outcome as an annual CPP benchmark for Street Outreach teams only.

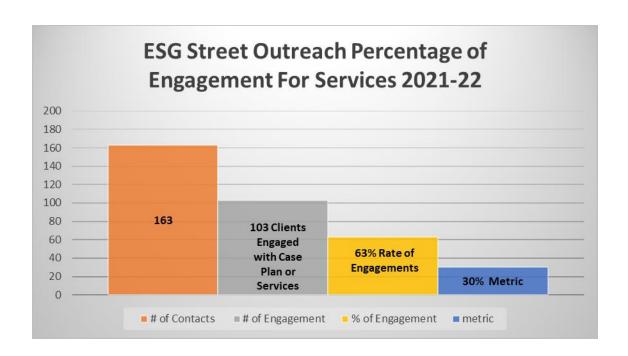


The Exits to Permanent Housing benchmark measures the percentage of distinct households that exited into permanent housing (PH), RRH and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), during the report period. The PH includes but is not limited to:

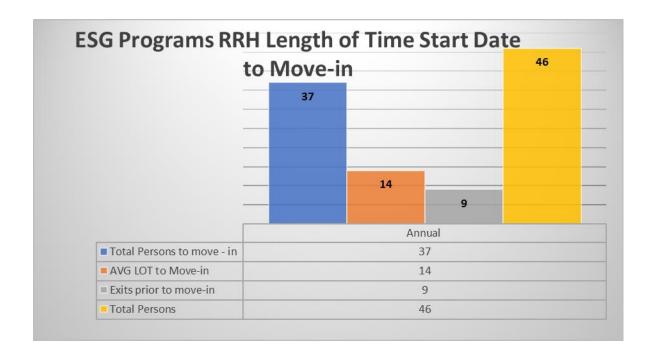
- Rental by client with Rapid Re-Housing, equivalent subsidy with Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) (tenant or project based) or public housing, VASH and HCV included,
- Permanent Supportive Housing,
- Owned by client, with or without ongoing housing subsidy,
- Rental by client with or without housing subsidy, with HCV voucher (tenant or project based),
- Staying or living with friends or friends, permanent tenure



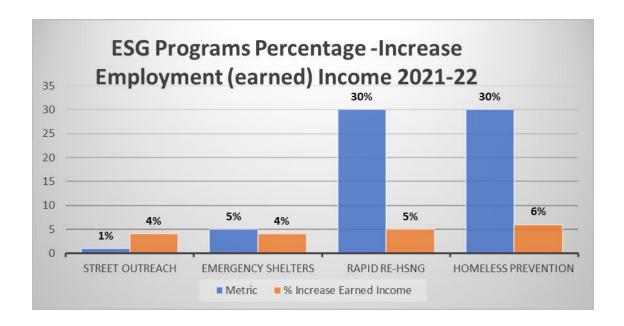




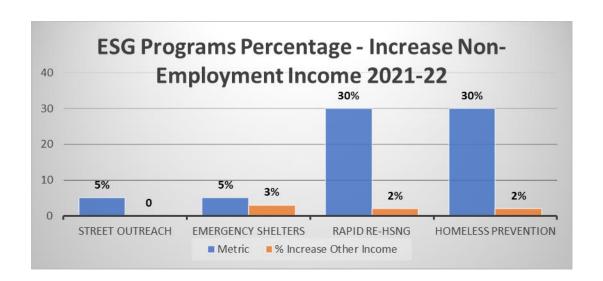
The Rate of engagement benchmark is measured by dividing the number of persons engaged (103) divided by the number of street contacts (163 persons contacted) during the report range. Tho persons engaged defined by actively participating in a case plan or supportive services like meals, housing, legal or medical services. The benchmark is 30% of the annual Total contact.



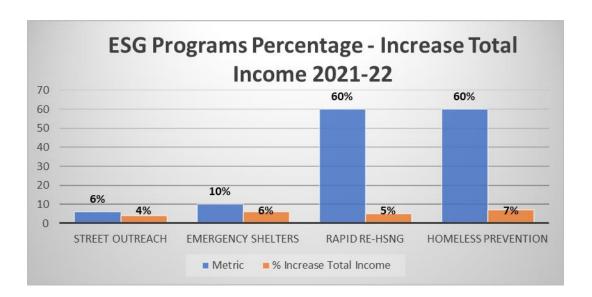
The Average Length of Time-Start date to Move In benchmark measures the average number of days from Start Date (eligibility) to Move -In date. Additionally looks at the clients where the head of household had a move-in date in the report date range plus leavers who exited in the date range and never had a move-in date. The benchmark is < or = to 30days.



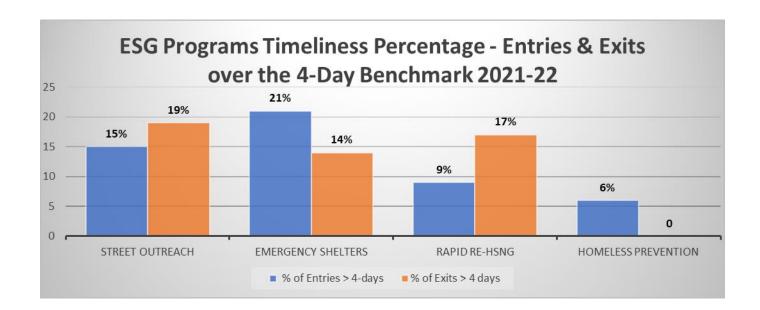
The Increase in Earned Income benchmark measures the percentage of adults who increased income from employment (earned) income from entry to exit or at the end of reporting period if not exited.

The Data Quality (DQ) – The Timeliness benchmark measures the percentage of entry and exits of clients completed into HMIS over the 4-day benchmark. Specifically, the benchmark will show the percentage of increases or decreases in the number of days to complete entry (project start) and to complete exits (project exit) of data from HMIS to less than 4 days.

The CoC Performance Committee recommended and the CoC Board approved establishing this 4-day benchmark to move toward alignment with HUD's Data Quality 5 year strategy to improve and address accurate, complete, and timely data.

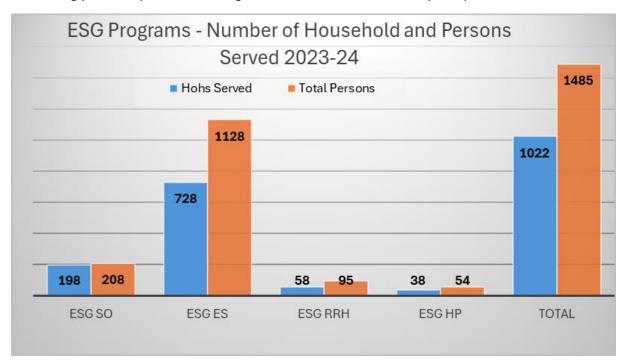

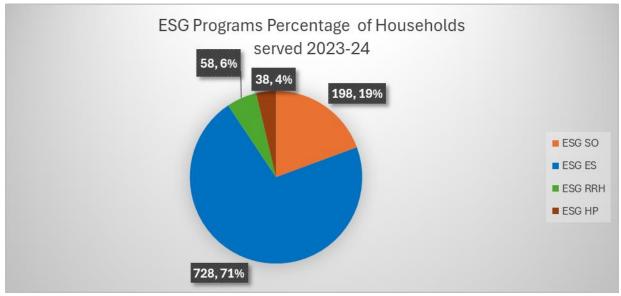

CR70 Graphs

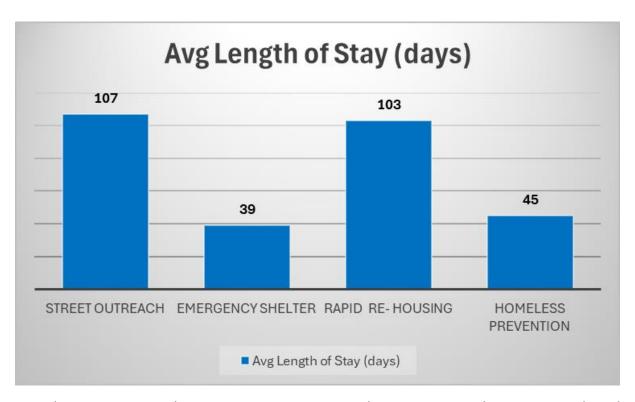
The CR70 graphs are the combined ESG sub-recipients, by-component, graphs, from HMIS data comparing actual performance by the Community Performance Plan (CPP) benchmarks. These comprehensive by-component graphs include Street Outreach (SO), Emergency Shelter (ES), Rapid Re-housing (RRH) and Homeless Prevention (HP) for ESG sub-recipients. The benchmarks for each program type were established and approved by the CoC Performance and Benchmarks Committee.

The report comes from an HMIS Administrative Annual Performance Report (APR) and the CAPER which is entered by each ESG sub-recipient into HMIS and then de-duplicated by HMIS. The data report spans a monitoring year of Sept 1, 2023 to August 31, 2024 in the combined by-component format.





The Length of Stay benchmark measures are the average number of days that a distinct household or person received services from an ESG program, calculated from the point of entry to the exit date. Average Length of Stay benchmark for Street Outreach (SO), Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) and Homeless Prevention (HP) will be noted and monitored (NM) but not evaluated as part of the Community Performance Plan (CPP) reviews. Additionally, these metrics have been approved for the 2022-23 monitoring year.



Regarding Street Outreach programs, HUD recognizes that street outreach teams move homeless individuals from the streets into an emergency (ES) or transitional shelter (TH) first, not primarily into permanent housing. this move to ES and TH is still considered homelessness. However, HUD also recognizes these outreach efforts are a positive outcome. Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing provide the individual with a safe environment which allows access to a case manager that will provide information on permanent housing solutions and other needed services. The Performance Committee and CoC Board in guidance with HUD recommendations see these placements from the street to a shelter as a positive housing outcome and approved the Positive Housing Outcome as an annual CPP benchmark for Street Outreach teams only.

In 2023-24 HUD, recognized that some exit destinations are considered a positive exit destinations but still measured as Returns to Homelessness, if they meet the HUD definition. These positive exit destinations are:

Homeless situations (ES)

Emergency shelter, Host Home

- Hotel /motel paid by ES vouchers,
- Host Home

Temporary situations (TH)

- Transition housing including those for youth
- Hotel /motel paid by ES vouchers,
- With family and friends on a temporary tenure

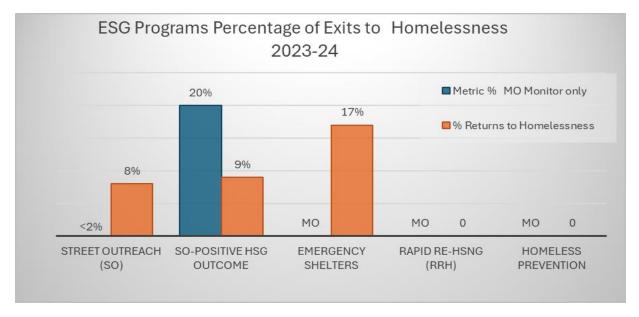
Institutional situations

- Foster Care home or group home
- Psychiatric facility
- substance abuse facility or detox center
- long term nursing facility,
- psychiatric facility,
- family and friends on temporary tenure

or Returns to Homelessness benchmark measures the percentage of the number of leavers who exited to homelessness, or temporary destinations from the total number of leavers. Exit Destinations are considered Returns to Homelessness if they meet these HUD definitions;

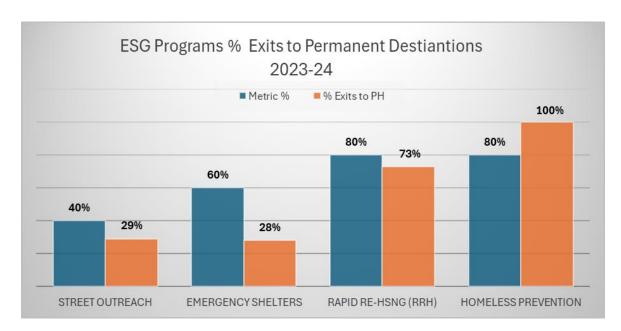
- Emergency shelters, including hotel or motel paid for without a emergency shelter voucher,
- Transitional housing for homeless persons (including homeless youth) or
- Place not meant for habitation (e.g., a vehicle, alley, streets or an abandoned building).

According to the HUD definition, this move to ES and TH is still considered homelessness. However, HUD also recognizes these outreach efforts are a positive outcome. Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing provide the individual with a safe environment which allows access to a case manager that will provide information on permanent housing solutions and other needed services. The Performance Committee and CoC Board in guidance with HUD recommendations see these placements from the street to a shelter as a positive housing outcome and approved the Positive Housing Outcome as an annual CPP benchmark for Street Outreach teams only.



The Exits to Permanent Housing benchmark measures the percentage of distinct households that exited into permanent housing (PH), RRH and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), during the report period. The PH includes but is not limited to;

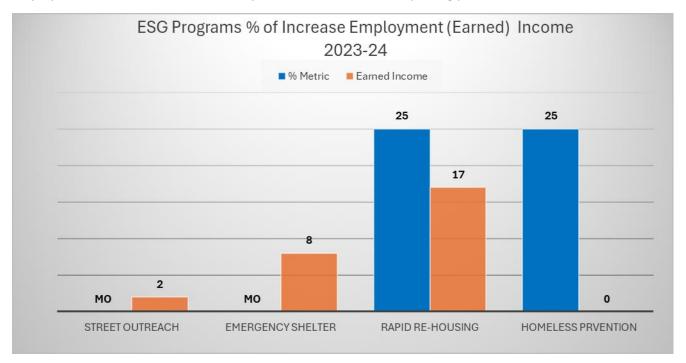
- Rental by client with Rapid Re-Housing, equivalent subsidy with Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) (tenant or project based) or public housing, VASH and HCV included,
- Permanent Supportive Housing,
- Owned by client, with or without ongoing housing subsidy,

- Staying or living with friends or friends, permanent tenure



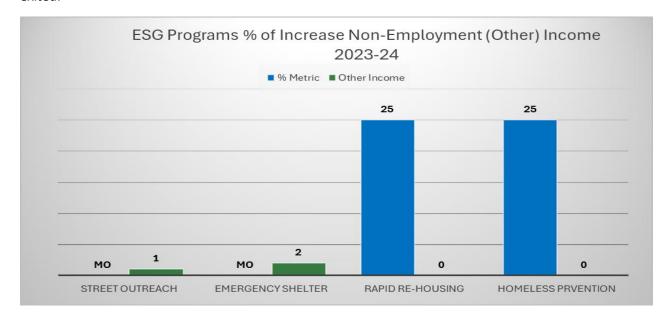
The Rate of engagement benchmark is measured by dividing the number of persons engaged (155) divided by the number of street contacts (159) persons contacted) during the report range. The persons engaged defined by actively participating in a case plan or supportive services like meals, housing, legal or medical services. The 2023-24 benchmark is 30% of the annual Total contact.



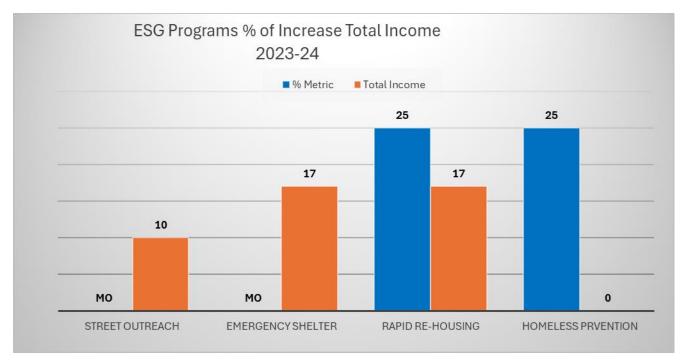
The Increase in Earned Income benchmark measures the percentage of adults who increased income from employment (earned) income from entry to exit or at the end of reporting period if not exited.



The Increase in Non-Employment Income benchmark measures the percentage of adults who increased income from non-employment or other income from entry to exit or at the end of reporting period if not exited.

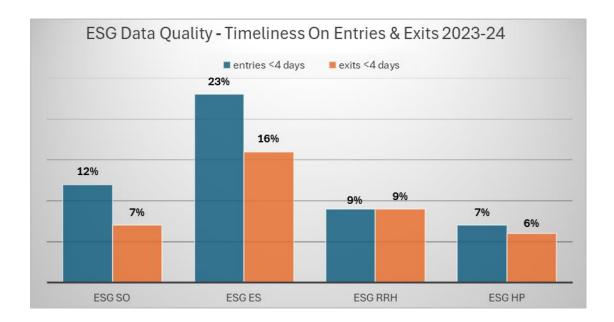


The Increase in Total Income benchmark measures the percentage of the number from total adults (Including those with no income) served during the report period who had an increase in their employment, non-employment and total income amount from entry to exit (or at the end of reporting period, if not exited from the project



The Data Quality (DQ) – The Timeliness benchmark measures the percentage of entry and exits of clients completed into HMIS over the 4-day benchmark. Specifically, the benchmark will show the percentage of increases or decreases in the number of days to complete entry (project start) and to complete exits (project exit) of data from HMIS to less than 4 days.

The CoC Performance Committee recommended and the CoC Board approved establishing this 4-day b urate, complete, and timely data benchmark to move toward alignment with HUD's Data Quality 5 year strategy to improve and address accurate, complete, and timely data.

The purpose of the City of El Paso's 2020 Analysis of Impediments (AI) to Fair Housing Choice is to assess existing local policies, demographics, market conditions and public perceptions and how they may impede housing choice for El Paso residents based on their race, color, religion, national origin, disability, familial status, sex, sexual orientation, and gender identification. That assessment then serves as the basis for identification of specific impediments to fair housing choice and a plan of action to address those impediments.

The AI was developed by the City of EI Paso, Department of Community + Human Development and Fair Housing Task Force along with the City's 5-Year Consolidated Plan for U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Entitlement Grant Funds. Those funds are a key resource for addressing impediments to fair housing choice. The process for developing the AI began with public outreach through a joint Consolidated Plan and Analysis of Impediments Community Survey that was distributed throughout the community through neighborhood associations, public events and gatherings, nonprofit public service agencies, and the Housing Authority for the City of EI Paso (HACEP). A summary of survey findings is provided in the Community Survey section of this document. The AI is also significantly informed by conversations with the Fair Housing Task Force, affordable housing developers, and other key community stakeholders, as well as other City planning documents including the EI Paso Regional Housing Plan, The City of EI Paso Financial Empowerment Blueprint, and Resilient EI Paso. Through this process, several existing impediments to fair housing choice surfaced:

- While reported complaints of illegal housing discrimination are very infrequent in El Paso, that
 may be the result of a lack of understanding on the part of El Paso residents of their fair housing
 rights and the resources available to report housing discrimination.
- The City of El Paso can improve on its system for tracking fair housing complaints, documenting resolution of those cases, and reporting these items to the Fair Housing Task Force.
- Many cities have local ordinances that expand the definition of "protected classes" beyond
 those identified by the Fair Housing Act, and HUD will investigate complaints based on those
 expanded definitions. The Fair Housing Act does not identify LGBTQ individuals as a protected
 class and The City of El Paso does not currently have legal protections for housing discrimination
 against the LGBTQ community.
- Perhaps the greatest impediment to housing choice in El Paso is housing affordability.

To address these impediments, the AI establishes a plan of action that includes:

- restructuring fair housing outreach/marketing under CDBG funding,
- rethinking the City's fair housing complaint tracking and reporting process,
- developing a housing equity ordinance, or updating the existing Fair Housing Ordinance to protect LGBTQ persons from housing discrimination, and
- Continuing implementation of the El Paso Regional Housing Plan, City of El Paso Financial Empowerment Blueprint, and Resilient El Paso to ensure affordable housing choice for all El Pasoans

The following impediments to fair housing choice were identified through community surveys, stakeholder conversations, ongoing fair housing complaints, a review of 2016 impediments, and demographic and market research.

Impediment #1 - While reported complaints of illegal housing discrimination are very infrequent in El Paso, that may be the result of a lack of understanding on the part of El Paso residents of their fair housing rights and the resources available to report housing discrimination.

- **Goal #1** Increase the public's awareness of their rights under the Fair Housing Act and how to report housing discrimination.
 - Plan of Action The City established a partnership with Texas RioGrande Legal Aid to host quarterly Renters Rights Sessions and information fairs open to the public in different areas throughout the City to educate residents on their rights and obligations. These educational seminars included food and beverage with targeted outreach towards vulnerable populations such as persons with disabilities, senior citizens, and LGBTQ+. The goal is to retain this partnership and solidify additional collaborative opportunities to expand on this critical awareness for all tenants.

Impediment #2 - The City of El Paso can improve on its system for tracking fair housing complaints, documenting resolution of those cases, and reporting those items to the Fair Housing Task Force.

- Goal #2 Enhance the City's process for tracking and reporting fair housing complaints.
 - Plan of Action 1) The City of El Paso, Department of Community + Human Development (DCHD) will create a cross-functional team (CFT) to establish a new process for tracking fair housing complaints and reporting those complaints to the Fair Housing Task Force and the community at-large.
 - 2) That process may include investments in technology and/or software that are designed to track fair housing complaints.
 - 3) Finally, DCHD will develop a *Fair Housing Dashboard* on the department's webpage allowing for the community at-large to access information regarding fair housing complaints that are under investigation, and the results of complaints following investigations.

Impediment #3 - Many cities have local ordinances that expand the definition of "protected classes" beyond those identified by the Fair Housing Act, and HUD will investigate complaints based on those expanded definitions. The Fair Housing Act does not identify LGBTQ individuals as a protected class and The City of El Paso does not currently have legal protections for housing discrimination against the LGBTQ community.

- Goal #3 Ensure that all El Pasoans are protected against housing discrimination.
 - Plan of Action Develop a CFT of City departments (ex. Legal, DCHD, Performance Office), Fair Housing Task Force members, community advocates, and elected officials to develop an Equity Ordinance that includes LGBTQ individuals as a "protected class".

Impediment #4 - Perhaps the greatest impediment to housing choice in El Paso is housing affordability.

- Goal #4 Increase affordable housing choice for all El Pasoans.
 - Plan of Action The City of El Paso must remain committed to implementing the El Paso Regional Housing Plan, The City of El Paso Financial Empowerment Blueprint, and Resilient El Paso. All three of these adopted plans/strategies address different aspects of the housing affordability challenges facing all El Pasoans, particularly those of low and moderate income.

HOPWA formula grantees are required to submit a Performance Report demonstrating coordination with other Consolidated Plan resources. HUD uses the Performance Report data to obtain essential information on grant activities, project sponsors, housing sites, units and households, and beneficiaries (which includes racial and ethnic data on program participants). The Consolidated Plan Management Process tool (CPMP) provides an optional tool to integrate the reporting of HOPWA specific activities with other planning and reporting on Consolidated Plan activities.

These are intended to match the elements under HMIS. The HOPWA program-level data elements include: Income and Sources, Non-Cash Benefits, HIV/AIDS Status, Services Provided, Housing Status or Destination at the end of the operating year, Physical Disability, Developmental Disability, Chronic Health Condition, Mental Health, Substance Abuse, Domestic Violence, Medical Assistance, and T-cell Count. Other HOPWA projects sponsors may also benefit from collecting these data elements. HMIS local data systems must maintain client confidentiality by using a closed system in which medical information and HIV status are only shared with providers that have a direct involvement in the client's case management,

Formula Operating Year. HOPWA formula grants are annually awarded for a three-year period of performance with three operating years. The information contained in this Performance Report must represent a one-year period of HOPWA program operation that coincides with the grantee's program year; this is the operating year. More than one HOPWA formula grant awarded to the same grantee may be used during an operating year and the Performance Report must capture all formula grant funding used during the operating year. Project sponsor accomplishment information must also coincide with the operating year this Performance Report covers. Any change to the period of performance requires the approval of HUD by amendment, such as an extension for an

Competitive Operating Year. HOPWA competitive grants are awarded for a three-year period of performance with Performance Reports submitted for each of the three operating years. Definitions

Achieved Viral Suppression: When the load or volume of HIV virus present in a person's blood is measured at less than 200 copies per milliliter of blood.

Adjustment for Duplication: Enables the calculation of unduplicated output totals by accounting for the total number of households or units that received more than one type of HOPWA assistance in a given service category such as HOPWA Subsidy Assistance or Supportive Services.

Administrative Costs: Costs for general management, oversight, coordination, evaluation, and reporting. By statute, grantee administrative costs are limited to 3% of the total grant award, to be expended over the life of the grant. Project sponsor administrative costs are limited to 7% of the portion of the grant amount they receive.

Anti-Retroviral Therapy: The combination of drugs used to treat HIV.

Area Median Income: The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) sets income limits that determine eligibility for assisted housing programs including the HOPWA program. HUD develops income limits based on Median Family Income estimates and Fair Market Rent area definitions for each metropolitan area, parts of some metropolitan areas, and each non-metropolitan county. AMI values vary by location and are

Beneficiary(ies): All members of a household (with or without HIV) who benefitted from HOPWA assistance during the operating year, NOT including the HOPWA eligible individual (see definition).

Chronically Homeless Person: An individual or family who is homeless and lives or resides as an individual or family who a) lives or resides in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter; b) has been homeless and living or residing in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter continuously for at least one year or on at least four separate occasions in the last three years; and c) has an adult head of household (or a minor head of household if no adult is present in the household) with a diagnosable substance use disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability (as defined in section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000 (42 U.S.C. 15002), post-traumatic stress disorder, cognitive impairments resulting from a brain injury, or chronic physical illness or disability, including the co-occurrence of two or more of those conditions. Additionally, the statutory definition includes as chronically homeless a person who currently lives or resides in an institutional care facility, including a jail, substance abuse or mental health treatment facility, hospital or other similar facility, and has resided there for fewer than 90 days if such person met the other criteria for homeless prior to entering that

Disabling Condition: Evidencing a diagnosable substance use disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability, chronic physical illness, or disability, including the co-occurrence of two or more of these conditions. In addition, a disabling condition may limit an individual's ability to work or perform one or more activities of daily living. An HIV/AIDS diagnosis is considered a disabling condition.

Facility-Based Housing Assistance: All eligible HOPWA Housing expenditures for or associated with supporting facilities including community residences, SRO dwellings, short-term facilities, project-based rental units, master leased units, and other housing facilities approved by HUD.

Faith-Based Organization: Religious organizations of three types: (1) congregations; (2) national networks, which include national denominations, their social service arms (for example, Catholic Charities, Lutheran Social Services), and networks of related organizations (such as YMCA and YWCA); and (3) freestanding religious organizations, which are incorporated separately from congregations and national networks.

Grassroots Organization: An organization headquartered in the local community where it provides services; has a social services budget of \$300,000 or less annually, and six or fewer full-time equivalent employees. Local affiliates of national organizations are not considered "grassroots."

HOPWA Eligible Individual: The one (1) low-income person with HIV/AIDS who qualifies a household for HOPWA assistance. This person may be considered "Head of Household." When the Performance Report asks for information on eligible individuals, report on this individual person only. Where there is more than one person with HIV/AIDS in the household, the additional PWH/A(s), would be considered a beneficiary(s).

HOPWA Housing Information Services: Services dedicated to helping persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families to identify, locate, and acquire housing. This may also include fair housing counseling for eligible persons who may encounter discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, familial status, or

HOPWA Housing Subsidy Assistance Total: The unduplicated number of households receiving housing subsidies (TBRA, STRMU, Permanent Housing Placement services and Master Leasing) and/or residing in units of facilities dedicated to persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families and supported with HOPWA funds during the

Household: A single individual or a family composed of two or more persons for which household incomes are used to determine eligibility and for calculation of the resident rent payment. The term is used for collecting data on changes in income, changes in access to services, receipt of housing information services, and outcomes on achieving housing stability. Live-In Aides (see definition for Live-In Aide) and non-beneficiaries (e.g., a shared housing arrangement with a roommate) who resided in the unit are not reported in the Performance Report.

Housing Stability: The degree to which the HOPWA project assisted beneficiaries to remain in stable housing during the operating year.

Improved HIV Viral Load: A reduction in the load or volume of HIV present in the HOPWA eligible individual's blood at the end of the reporting period compared to the beginning of the reporting period. Most PLWHA who are engaged in medical care have routine laboratory tests. The HOPWA eligible individual's latest laboratory

In-kind Leveraged Resources: These are additional types of support provided to assist HOPWA beneficiaries such as volunteer services, materials, use of equipment and building space. The actual value of the support can be the contribution of professional services, based on customary rates for this specialized support, or actual costs contributed from other leveraged resources. In determining a rate for the contribution of volunteer time and services, use the criteria described in 2 CFR 200. The value of any donated material, equipment, building, or lease should be based on the fair market value at time of donation. Related documentation can be from recent bills of sales, advertised prices, appraisals, or other information for comparable property similarly situated.

Leveraged Funds: The amount of funds expended during the operating year from non-HOPWA federal, state, local, and private sources by grantees or sponsors in dedicating assistance to this client population. Leveraged funds or other assistance are used directly in or in support of HOPWA program delivery.

Live-In Aide: A person who resides with the HOPWA Eligible Individual and who meets the following criteria: (1) is essential to the care and well-being of the person; (2) is not obligated for the support of the person; and (3) would not be living in the unit except to provide the necessary supportive services. See Code of Federal Regulations Title 24 Part 5.403 and the HOPWA Grantee Oversight Resource Guide for additional reference.

Master Leasing: Applies to a nonprofit or public agency that leases units of housing (scattered-sites or entire buildings) from a landlord and subleases the units to homeless or low-income tenants. By assuming the tenancy burden, the agency facilitates housing of clients who may not be able to maintain a lease on their own due to

Medically Assisted Living Facilities: HOPWA facility-based housing that assists residents with most or all activities of daily living, such as meals, bathing, dressing, and toileting. Regular medical care, supervision, and

Nonbinary: A gender other than singularly female or male.

Operating Costs: Applies to facility-based housing only, for facilities that are currently open. Operating costs can include day-to-day housing function and operation costs like utilities, maintenance, equipment, insurance, security, furnishings, supplies and salary for staff costs directly related to the housing project but not staff costs

Outcome: The degree to which the HOPWA assisted household has been enabled to establish or maintain a stable living environment in housing that is safe, decent, and sanitary, (per the regulations at 24 CFR 574.310(b)) and to reduce the risks of homelessness and improve access to HIV treatment and other health care and support.

Output: The number of units of housing or households that receive HOPWA assistance during the operating year.

Permanent Housing Placement: A supportive housing service that helps establish the household in the housing unit, including but not limited to reasonable costs for security deposits not to exceed two months of rent costs.

Program Income: Gross income directly generated from the use of HOPWA funds, including repayments. See grant administration requirements on program income at 2 CFR 200.307.

Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA): A rental subsidy program that is tied to specific facilities or units owned or controlled by a project sponsor. Assistance is tied directly to the properties and is not portable or transferable.

Project Sponsor Organizations: Per HOPWA regulations at 24 CFR 574.3, any nonprofit organization or governmental housing agency that receives funds under a contract with the grantee to provide eligible housing and other support services or administrative services as defined in 24 CFR 574.300. Project Sponsor organizations are required to provide performance data on households served and funds expended.

SAM: All organizations applying for a Federal award must have a valid registration active at sam.gov. SAM (System for Award Management) registration includes maintaining current information and providing a valid

Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU) Assistance: A time-limited, housing subsidy assistance designed to prevent homelessness and increase housing stability. Grantees may provide assistance for up to 21 weeks in any 52-week period. The amount of assistance varies per client depending on funds available, tenant

Stewardship Units: Units developed with HOPWA, where HOPWA funds were used for acquisition, new construction and rehabilitation that no longer receive operating subsidies from HOPWA. Report information for the units is subject to the three-year use agreement if rehabilitation is non-substantial and to the ten-year use

Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA): TBRA is a rental subsidy program similar to the Housing Choice Voucher program that grantees can provide to help low-income households access affordable housing. The TBRA voucher is not tied to a specific unit, so tenants may move to a different unit without losing their assistance, subject to individual program rules. The subsidy amount is determined in part based on household income and rental costs

Transgender: Transgender is defined as a person who identifies with, or presents as, a gender that is different from his/her gender assigned at birth

VAWA Internal Emergency Transfers: Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would not be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant may reside in the new unit without having to undergo an application process.

VAWA External Emergency Transfers: Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant must undergo an application process in order to reside in the new unit.

Veteran: A veteran is someone who has served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. This does not include inactive military reserves or the National Guard unless the person was called up to active duty.

HMIS local data systems must maintain client confidentiality by using a closed system in which medical information and HIV status are only shared with providers that have a direct involvement in the client's case management,

Formula Operating Year. HOPWA formula grants are annually awarded for a three-year period of performance with three operating years. The information contained in this Performance Report must represent a one-year period of HOPWA program operation that coincides with the grantee's program year; this is the operating year. More than one HOPWA formula grant awarded to the same grantee may be used during an operating year and the Performance Report must capture all formula grant funding used during the operating year. Project sponsor accomplishment information must also coincide with the operating year this Performance Report covers. Definitions

Achieved Viral Suppression: When the load or volume of HIV virus present in a person's blood is measured at less than 200 copies per milliliter of blood.

Adjustment for Duplication: Enables the calculation of unduplicated output totals by accounting for the total number of households or units that received more than one type of HOPWA assistance in a given service category such as HOPWA Subsidy Assistance or Supportive Services.

Administrative Costs: Costs for general management, oversight, coordination, evaluation, and reporting. By statute, grantee administrative costs are limited to 3% of the total grant award, to be expended over the life of the grant. Project sponsor administrative costs are limited to 7% of the portion of the grant amount they receive.

Anti-Retroviral Therapy: The combination of drugs used to treat HIV.

Area Median Income: The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) sets income limits that determine eligibility for assisted housing programs including the HOPWA program. HUD develops income limits based on Median Family Income estimates and Fair Market Rent area definitions for each metropolitan area, parts of some metropolitan areas, and each non-metropolitan county. AMI values vary by location and are

Beneficiary(ies): All members of a household (with or without HIV) who benefitted from HOPWA assistance during the operating year, NOT including the HOPWA eligible individual (see definition).

Chronically Homeless Person: An individual or family who is homeless and lives or resides as an individual or family who a) lives or resides in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter; b) has been homeless and living or residing in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter continuously for at least one year or on at least four separate occasions in the last three years; and c) has an adult head of household (or a minor head of household if no adult is present in the household) with a diagnosable substance use disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability (as defined in section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000 (42 U.S.C. 15002), post-traumatic stress disorder, cognitive impairments resulting from a brain injury, or chronic physical illness or disability, including the co-occurrence of two or more of those conditions. Additionally, the statutory definition includes as chronically homeless a person who currently lives or resides in an institutional care facility, including a jail, substance abuse or mental health treatment facility, hospital or other similar facility, and has resided there for fewer than 90 days if such person met the other criteria for homeless prior to entering that

Disabling Condition: Evidencing a diagnosable substance use disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability, chronic physical illness, or disability, including the co-occurrence of two or more of these conditions. In addition, a disabling condition may limit an individual's ability to work or perform one or more activities of daily living. An HIV/AIDS diagnosis is considered a disabling condition.

Facility-Based Housing Assistance: All eligible HOPWA Housing expenditures for or associated with supporting facilities including community residences, SRO dwellings, short-term facilities, project-based rental units, master leased units, and other housing facilities approved by HUD.

Faith-Based Organization: Religious organizations of three types: (1) congregations; (2) national networks, which include national denominations, their social service arms (for example, Catholic Charities, Lutheran Social Services), and networks of related organizations (such as YMCA and YWCA); and (3) freestanding religious organizations, which are incorporated separately from congregations and national networks.

Grassroots Organization: An organization headquartered in the local community where it provides services; has a social services budget of \$300,000 or less annually, and six or fewer full-time equivalent employees. Local affiliates of national organizations are not considered "grassroots."

HOPWA Eligible Individual: The one (1) low-income person with HIV/AIDS who qualifies a household for HOPWA assistance. This person may be considered "Head of Household." When the Performance Report asks for information on eligible individuals, report on this individual person only. Where there is more than one person with HIV/AIDS in the household, the additional PWH/A(s), would be considered a beneficiary(s).

HOPWA Housing Information Services: Services dedicated to helping persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families to identify, locate, and acquire housing. This may also include fair housing counseling for eligible persons who may encounter discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, familial status, or

HOPWA Housing Subsidy Assistance Total: The unduplicated number of households receiving housing subsidies (TBRA, STRMU, Permanent Housing Placement services and Master Leasing) and/or residing in units of facilities dedicated to persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families and supported with HOPWA funds during the

Household: A single individual or a family composed of two or more persons for which household incomes are used to determine eligibility and for calculation of the resident rent payment. The term is used for collecting data on changes in income, changes in access to services, receipt of housing information services, and outcomes on achieving housing stability. Live-In Aides (see definition for Live-In Aide) and non-beneficiaries (e.g., a shared housing arrangement with a roommate) who resided in the unit are not reported in the Performance Report. **Housing Stability:** The degree to which the HOPWA project assisted beneficiaries to remain in stable housing during the operating year.

Improved HIV Viral Load: A reduction in the load or volume of HIV present in the HOPWA eligible individual's blood at the end of the reporting period compared to the beginning of the reporting period. Most PLWHA who are engaged in medical care have routine laboratory tests. The HOPWA eligible individual's latest laboratory

In-kind Leveraged Resources: These are additional types of support provided to assist HOPWA beneficiaries such as volunteer services, materials, use of equipment and building space. The actual value of the support can be the contribution of professional services, based on customary rates for this specialized support, or actual costs contributed from other leveraged resources. In determining a rate for the contribution of volunteer time and services, use the criteria described in 2 CFR 200. The value of any donated material, equipment, building, or lease should be based on the fair market value at time of donation. Related documentation can be from recent bills of sales, advertised prices, appraisals, or other information for comparable property similarly situated.

Leveraged Funds: The amount of funds expended during the operating year from non-HOPWA federal, state, local, and private sources by grantees or sponsors in dedicating assistance to this client population. Leveraged funds or other assistance are used directly in or in support of HOPWA program delivery.

Live-In Aide: A person who resides with the HOPWA Eligible Individual and who meets the following criteria: (1) is essential to the care and well-being of the person; (2) is not obligated for the support of the person; and (3) would not be living in the unit except to provide the necessary supportive services. See Code of Federal Regulations Title 24 Part 5.403 and the HOPWA Grantee Oversight Resource Guide for additional reference.

Master Leasing: Applies to a nonprofit or public agency that leases units of housing (scattered-sites or entire buildings) from a landlord and subleases the units to homeless or low-income tenants. By assuming the tenancy burden, the agency facilitates housing of clients who may not be able to maintain a lease on their own due to poor credit, evictions, or lack of sufficient income.

Medically Assisted Living Facilities: HOPWA facility-based housing that assists residents with most or all activities of daily living, such as meals, bathing, dressing, and toileting. Regular medical care, supervision, and **Nonbinary:** A gender other than singularly female or male.

Operating Costs: Applies to facility-based housing only, for facilities that are currently open. Operating costs can include day-to-day housing function and operation costs like utilities, maintenance, equipment, insurance, security, furnishings, supplies and salary for staff costs directly related to the housing project but not staff costs

Outcome: The degree to which the HOPWA assisted household has been enabled to establish or maintain a stable living environment in housing that is safe, decent, and sanitary, (per the regulations at 24 CFR 574.310(b)) and to reduce the risks of homelessness and improve access to HIV treatment and other health care and support.

Output: The number of units of housing or households that receive HOPWA assistance during the operating year. **Permanent Housing Placement:** A supportive housing service that helps establish the household in the housing unit, including but not limited to reasonable costs for security deposits not to exceed two months of rent costs.

Program Income: Gross income directly generated from the use of HOPWA funds, including repayments. See grant administration requirements on program income at 2 CFR 200.307.

Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA): A rental subsidy program that is tied to specific facilities or units owned or controlled by a project sponsor. Assistance is tied directly to the properties and is not portable or transferable.

Project Sponsor Organizations: Per HOPWA regulations at 24 CFR 574.3, any nonprofit organization or governmental housing agency that receives funds under a contract with the grantee to provide eligible housing and other support services or administrative services as defined in 24 CFR 574.300. Project Sponsor organizations are required to provide performance data on households served and funds expended.

SAM: All organizations applying for a Federal award must have a valid registration active at sam.gov. SAM (System for Award Management) registration includes maintaining current information and providing a valid

Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU) Assistance: A time-limited, housing subsidy assistance designed to prevent homelessness and increase housing stability. Grantees may provide assistance for up to 21 weeks in any 52-week period. The amount of assistance varies per client depending on funds available, tenant

Stewardship Units: Units developed with HOPWA, where HOPWA funds were used for acquisition, new construction and rehabilitation that no longer receive operating subsidies from HOPWA. Report information for the units is subject to the three-year use agreement if rehabilitation is non-substantial and to the ten-year use

Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA): TBRA is a rental subsidy program similar to the Housing Choice Voucher program that grantees can provide to help low-income households access affordable housing. The TBRA voucher is not tied to a specific unit, so tenants may move to a different unit without losing their assistance, subject to individual program rules. The subsidy amount is determined in part based on household income and rental costs

Transgender: Transgender is defined as a person who identifies with, or presents as, a gender that is different from his/her gender assigned at birth

VAWA Internal Emergency Transfers: Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would not be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant may reside in the new unit without having to undergo an application process.

VAWA External Emergency Transfers: Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant must undergo an application process in order to reside in the new unit.

Veteran: A veteran is someone who has served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. This does not include inactive military reserves or the National Guard unless the person was called up to active duty.

HOPWA services to the El Paso community. In addition to the 90 households, 29 additional
beneficiaries/members also benefited from the program, bringing the total number of individuals served to
119. Supportive Services and Case Management play a critical role in assisting individuals, offering nutritional
support, outreach services, and referrals to social services. These services include access to food banks, meals/nutritional services, and bus passes. Through effective case management, the Department of Public Health ensures that clients maintain housing stability while improving healthcare access. The comprehensive approach includes referrals for medical healthcare through Ryan White service providers, mental health counseling, substance use treatment, job training, nutritional services, and education on biomedical interventions like Treatment as Prevention (TASP) and Undetectable = Untransmissible (U=U). To deliver these services, the DPH collaborates with various community organizations and local institutions through memoranda of understanding and inter-local agreements, ensuring a network of support for those served.

By the end of YR49, a total of 90 clients were enrolled in the program, with 72 of those individuals identified as Hispanic. Additionally, 29 household members or beneficiaries were identified, resulting in a total of 119 people benefiting from the HOPWA Program. Of the newly enrolled clients during this reporting period, five individuals met the criteria for experiencing chronic homelessness. Despite income challenges, all 90 clients were able to access or maintain ource of medical insurance, ensuring critical healthcare coverage. Additionally, every client was present in-Retroviral Therapy (ART) and experienced improved viral load outcomes or achieved viral suppresents of program retention, 38 clients have been with the program for 1-5 years, while 31 households been served for over 5 years but less than 10. housing, medical, and supportive needs. These services underscore the program's effectiveness in promoting housing stability and overall well-being for its clients.
