Total Trips

Average weekday trip volume over time





Change in Trip Volume

Change in average weekday trip volume, last week versus selected comparison week



COVID19 Impact to Society:



- 50% capacity only for Restaurant owners
- \$60M budget shortfall (sales tax revenue shortfall)
- Increased stress over quarantine, reduced social interactions
- Increased stress over the unknown economic environment
- Outdoor space safest environment for people to get exercise and active lifestyle to battle health impacts of pandemic

COVID19 Recovery Program:

• Stimulate Local Business

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- Provide outdoor space for quarantine relief
- maintain Social Distancing guidelines

Prototypes

Prototype 1: ROW Cafe









R.O.W Cafe:

Stanton; between Mills and Texas

- Additional lane as space for outdoor seating
- 2-week trial





Prototypes

Prototype 2: Ped-way (pedestrian lanes)









Ped-Way: Campbell; between 3rd and 6th

- Added outdoor space for commuting and physical activity
- 2-week trial







3. Proposed Program – available for all applicants

Proposed Pilot Program:

- Aligns with emergency order duration time, with sunset date or possible extension to be determined
- All eligible streets identified by CID planning and S&M that meet criteria
- All private properties may apply for inclusion
- All spaces proposed for public use need to submit for an application, whether private or publicly owned.









• [Streets]: Addressing any use of ROW for safe distancing practices; partial street closure + traffic lane reduction + more sidewalk space = shared streets.



 [Business]: Addressing any use of outdoor space within a private property for a business to offer for safe distancing practices;
reduced parking requirements + outdoor seating = increased capacity



[Food Court]: Addressing use of joint outdoor space for multiple restaurants or food trucks to offer their patron;

closed ROW/shared parking lots + shared outdoor seating = shared increased capacity





- [Streets]: Use of ROW for safe distancing practices for private property owners:
 - Ped-Way (Pedestrian lane) for recreational use, pedestrian or bicycling commuting
 - **ROW Cafe** for businesses to offer additional space for their patrons outside their establishment for a partial street closure of a block
 - Parking-parklets for businesses to use on-street parking spaces for additional outside space for patrons







- **[Business]**: Providing additional use of outdoor space within a private property for business owners
 - Off-street surface or garage parking within their properties for:
 - Additional dining space
 - Queuing for pick-up





- **[Food Court]**: Providing use of joint outdoor space for multiple restaurants or food trucks to offer their patrons
 - Consolidated location on a partial street closure (on ROW)
 - Consolidated location on a shared off-street parking lot (within private property)

Pilot Program Accepted Uses:

2.

- Use of outdoor Space following CDC guidelines of tables 6' apart:
 - 1. The ROW adjacent/abutting private properties [streets]
 - 2. The parking abutting business within private parking; only to gain as much as original 100% capacity [business]
 - 3. The ROW to be used by group of businesses not directly adjacent/abutting [food court]



Pre-packaged application Process:

<u>E Mills Ave</u>

- No cost permit
- Eligibility criteria for streets
- Templates provided to allow for expedited review time
- Partial closure; shared street
- Pedestrian circulation path to be kept open

Barricades and prevetted TCP provided



Eligibility Criteria for Sun City Safe Streets ROW Cafe applications:

- Not obstructing bus stops
- Not on TxDOT ROW
- Not on Streetcar routes
- Min. 4 lane street





Commercially Zoned

Business Clusters

Speed Limit under 35 mph

Criteria for street selection may be added/removed/adjust as part of the program's evaluation

Downtown Eligible Sun City Safe Streets





Selection criteria for Ped-Ways:





Residential use



Within 500 feet of a trail/trailhead or ¼ mile of a park



Speed limits under 35 miles per hour



Pre-packaged application Process:

- No cost permit
- Outdoor space in private property to allow additional uses
- Parking requirements waived
- 50% of indoor footprint patron capacity allowed, for max 100% total occupancy.
- Business provided furniture
- Vehicular and Fire access to establishment maintained







Pre-packaged application Process:

- No cost permit
- satellite location for participating applicants
- Full street closure in part of a block
- 6' social distancing CDC guideline enforced
- Circulation path to be kept open
- Physical structures to be limited







Proposed Pilot Program: Pre-packaged application Process:

- Applicants will need to coordinate waste disposal and clean-up after each use
- To-go and delivery models for patrons outside in the ROW
 - Disposable plates, cups and dinnerware outside
 - No glass or non-disposable items
 - No transactions on the ROW

Emergency Order to facilitate Sun City Safe Program:

- In Conjunction with the State Emergency Orders:
 - To-go and Delivery models
- Prototypes to refine Pilot program process
- Application through OSS:
 - Free / No permit fee
 - Meet pre-eligibility criteria for TCP template implementation
 - Indemnification waiver and insurance when applicable
 - Additional documentation per program use
- Applicants to pay for barricade rental

Applicants go online to check:

- Eligibility critieria
- Templates
- Additional documentation

Sun City Safe Program Summary:



- Sun City Safe program coordinated as an expedited permit type in response to COVID 19:
 - Pilot process coordinated with multiple user departments
- City Pilot Prototypes to test-run initiative and finalize application and administrative process:
 - Ped-lane on Campbell Street (between 3rd and 6th)
 - ROW Café on Stanton (between Mills and Texas)
- Language in emergency order included to launch Pilot Sun City Safe Program throughout city
- Coordination with Economic Development to identify funding and economic assistance for applicants
